## TRUSTING GOD

**2 Chronicles 20: 1-7** 

hat do you do and to whom do you turn when life throws you one problem after another?

Worry and fear are two options chosen by many. However, God presents us with an alternative...trust. You see, worry and fear are crippling emotions. Trust and faith are centers of confidence, conviction and hope.

Jehoshaphat shows us what faith looks like when life turns south and sour. Outnumbered by advancing military enemies, Judah faced certain defeat. Children would become orphans.

Wives would become widows. Young men would become slaves. A massive social and economic meltdown was on the horizon.

But notice Jehoshaphat's expressions of TRUST:



#### [1] T-TALKED WITH GOD.

Trust in God emerges out of relationship with God. That is what Jehoshaphat invested in when he was faced with his challenge. He didn't depend solely on his military knowhow or his technical skills and competencies. His priority act was to call on God first.

Shouldn't we do the same?

You and I have the assurance that when we talk with God, God hears us; and God will respond. Now God may not always respond in ways that calm the storm around us, but when we talk with God, He definitely calms the storm with-

in us...reminding us that He is with us and will continue to sustain and keep us.

#### | [2] R-REMEMBERED | WHAT GOD DID IN THE

PAST. Jehoshaphat's confidence in God's ability to deliver Judah from their present predicament was bolstered by his recollection of God's activities in the past. We have often mistaken faith for blind belief in something that is unreasonable. There is no such thing as "blind faith". Faith is the antidote to blindness, not the cause of it. Trusting God is not an act of unreasonable belief. God has proven Godself time and again to be eminently trustworthy. Faith comprises the essence of our hope for the future based on God's consistency and faithfulness in the past.

extension you and I can walk through our struggles and face our future with confidence because we have a God whose track-records is

unquestioned, whose character is impeccable, whose love is unparalleled, whose faithfulness is steadfast, and whose presence is unshakable.

Now since this is true, I believe Jehoshaphat would encourage us to:

#### [3] U-UNDERSTAND THAT GOD HOLDS OUR LIVES TOGETH-

ER. Jehoshaphat's prayer was not offered to remind God about God's work in the past. God doesn't struggle with forgetfulness. Jehoshaphat's prayers were offered to remind himself and the people that their lives were in God's hands. God has a plan in every circumstance and every situ-

ation of our lives no matter how thorny and turbulent. We may never understand how God works. We may not even appreciate the outworking of God's purposes, but based on scriptures and our experiences of God we know that God has a plan for our lives.

God knows us and has promised to hold our lives together. Paul reminds us in Colossians 1: 16-17, that everything holds together in Jesus! No matter how things in your life seem to fall apart there is a loving Jesus who is holding you together!

#### [4] S-STAND IN THE SOLIDARITY

OF COMMUNITY. Jehoshaphat called the people to leave their homes and assemble to pray together, fast together, to engage God's presence together. He understood the power of community. In these days marked by environmental vulnerability, economic uncertainty, emotional instability and social fragility it behooves those of us who know the LORD to invest heavily in building community bonds of genuine care. It is now more than ever that we must use every opportunity to prove that the power of love that drives community, finds a way to connect whether by text, phone call, zoom meetings, or stopping at someone's gate. Find a way to supply someone's kitchen from your cupboard of your backyard garden. Find a way to encourage someone whose oil of hope is running low. Be that force that draws and keep people

connected to the solidarity of community.

But there is a final expression of TRUST that emerges from this text. Jehoshaphat and Judah expressed:

[5] T-THANKSGIVING. They celebrated and thanked God as an expression of their confidence in God's love and ability to rescue them. They thanked God before the battle was fought. They gave thanks before the battle was won. What an example for us! Thanksgiving is an expression of what we believe to be true: that God is on our side! It is that principle of our faith that aids in tri -focalism...looking back to recall God's goodness in the past, looking at how God is working God's purposes out in the present...and looking to the future with confidence that our God is the same yesterday, today, and forevermore.

Yes there are difficult days. However lets us TRUST GOD like Jehoshaphat:

Talk to God

Remember God's past acts Understand that God holds our lives together

**S**tand in solidarity of God's community

Thank God for His Faithfulness.

## LEADERSHIP CORNER What's the Purpose of Pastors?

#### (Part 2)

## What the Bible Says About Pastors

The Bible assures us that pastors exist to **shepherd God's people** in local churches until Christ returns (1 Peter 5:1-5). The calling of the pastor is inextricably tied to the biblical metaphor of a shepherd tending to his flock of sheep. Alexander Strauch says, "If we want to understand Christian elders and their work, we must understand the biblical imagery of shepherding. As keepers of sheep, New Testament elders are to protect, feed, lead and care for the flock's many practical needs."

Pastors shepherd God's people by protecting them. One of a pastor's foremost responsibilities is to protect his sheep, for just like sheep need the protection of a shepherd, God's people need the protection of pastors. Paul's farewell address makes it clear that this includes protection from false teachers: "Pay careful attention to vourselves and to all the flock, in which the Holy Spirit has made you overseers, to care for the church of God, which he obtained with his own blood" (Acts 20:28). It also includes protection from their own sinfulness, which is why a pastor is called to a ministry of exhortation—of calling people away from behavior that is dishonoring to God and toward behavior that is pleasing to him (Titus 2:15). It is why pastors eventually confront ongoing, unrepentant sin and enforce church discipline (Matthew 18:15-20).

Pastors shepherd God's people by feeding them. A shepherd not only protects his sheep from danger, but he also cares for them by feeding them. "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want," says David. "He makes me lie down in green pastures. He leads me beside still waters" (Psalm 23:1-2).

The shepherd provides for the sustenance of his sheep. Similarly, pastors must feed God's people with the spiritual food and drink they need—the Word of God. The pastor's ministry is a Word-based ministry in which he uses the Word for preaching, teaching and counseling. "He must hold firm to the trustworthy word as taught, so that he may be able to give instruction in sound doctrine and also to rebuke those who contradict it" (Titus 1:9).

## Pastors shepherd God's people by leading them.

Sheep are wandering creatures who are prone to meander out of safety and into all kinds of danger. They need a shepherd who will lead and guide them. In much the same way, Christians need pastors who will provide leadership. This is a specific form of leadership, though, that better equips them to fulfill the ministry to which God has called them. They carry out this leadership by setting an exam-

ple in godly character, knowing that the pastor's standard for character is really the standard for every Christian. "Shepherd the flock of God that is among you...being examples to the flock" (1 Peter 5:2-3).

Pastors shepherd God's people by caring for them.

Sheep that are ill or in distress rely upon their shepherd to tend to them. And when God's people are distressed or uncertain, they rely on their pastors to bring comfort, instill wisdom and offer prayer. "Is anyone among you sick? Let him call for the elders of the church, and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord" (James 5:14). The pastor has a special function in caring for the people in his charge.

#### Conclusion

God's church needs pastors. It needs pastors who will function not first as priests or CEOs, but as shepherds—shepherds who will protect God's people; feed them spiritual food; lead them by modeling godly character; and care for them in life's temptations, trials and triumphs. Ultimately, pastors exist to "care for the church of God, which he obtained with his own blood" (Acts 20:28).
