THEME FOR 42ND UCJCI SYNOD



ROOTED, RESILIENT: RESPONDING IN H.O.P.E.

The theme for the 42nd Synod of the United Church in Jamaica and the Cayman Islands was approved by The Central Mission Council, at it's sitting in November 2020.

The theme, which will be launched at the Ash Wednesday Day of Fellowship, is a declaration of defiance that, despite COVID 19 or any other calamity brought on the modern world, the United Church will actively pursue HOPE – Health, Opportunities, Peace and Evangelism by remaining rooted and working towards resilience.

A document offering contextual and theological justification, entitled 'the Road Map', outlines the journey

The difficulties and hardships of the day are a test of our faith and will in Christ, therefore we must press on.

towards the theme stating that “of the many words translated Church, the Hebrew ‘ey’dah,’ invites us in this season of the Church’s witness, to move beyond the physical sanctuary and to ‘witness’ in times of crisis and chaos, as we emerge and evolve with inspiring and life-giving ministries”.

“To be “rooted” [firmly implanted], speaks to our foundation: immovable, unshakeable, unchangeable and unstoppable. **WE ARE ROOTED IN CHRIST.** The Church has stood the test of time: historically, socially and politically and still stands, because her foundation was not of human initiation or intervention.”

The biblical basis for the theme, is “To be “resilient” [returning to the original form or

Are You Concerned About the COVID-19 Vaccine?



The COVID-19 pandemic has brought tremendous suffering, devastation and death upon the land. All areas of human life and relationships have been impacted by this health tragedy, at both the local and global level.

The government statistics in Jamaica indicate that, as of January 26, 2021, there have been **15,000** diagnosed cases; anecdotal reports suggest the number could be higher, with many infected persons being asymptomatic and unknowingly transmitting the virus.

Although COVID-19 vaccines have been developed to help stop the spread, some people are skeptical. They ask, “Should we take the vaccine? Can we trust that it is effective?” Their concern may be related to how quickly it was developed and any possible side-effects. Others may be ideologically opposed to all vaccines. While the decision is personal and/or familial, I offer the following bits of pastoral counsel to help in the decision-making process:

Avoid Being Overly Anxious. Although a measure of concern is necessary when considering serious matters we must not allow ourselves to become overwhelmed by fear of either the virus or the vaccine. Keeping a cool head will help us to think clearly and to make sober judgements.

Become Properly Informed. The antidote for ignorance is accurate information. Speaking with qualified and trusted health personnel, such as your family/community doctor or a public health professional will help to bring knowledge and comfort. Social Media platforms may not be the best place to get your information.

Can we trust that it is effective?”

Consider Others: There may be vulnerable persons (such as the elderly, or persons with chronic medical conditions) in your social circle, and while you may be able to survive contracting the virus, they may not. Hence, it would be in their best interest, as much as yours, to get vaccinated.

There is a highly contagious disease among us, causing great harm to our lives and livelihoods. We must all do what we can to reduce the spread. Making an informed choice to get vaccinated against COVID-19 may indeed be the wise, moral and Christian thing to do.

position after being bent, compressed or stretched], and speaks to what 2 Corinthians 4:8 & 9 declares as our way of being: "We are hard pressed on every side, but not crushed; perplexed, but not in despair; persecuted, but not abandoned; struck down, but not destroyed." (NIV)

Resilience and hope are directly connected, as seen in Paul's charge to see beyond their physical and present circumstances and to see through spiritual eyes that whatever it is and how it may appear to be, God has *not abandoned them. The same is true for us.*

UCJCI's main 'response' {our answer less in word and more in action}, at this time is HOPE. The Greek and Hebrew words—'elpis', 'yachal', 'sabar', 'chacah' - are not suggesting doing nothing, but as we wait, with careful discernment and prayer, we act, knowing that Yahweh [I am, that I am] is working alongside us.

We are called to remain **FAITHFUL**. To this end, for this time and for the future **HOPE** calls us to:

Become and be **HEALTHY**.

To harness all the God given **OPPORTUNITIES** now and in the future

To always pursue **PEACE** and yes,

EVANGELISM remains the heartbeat of the Church.

UCJCI SALUTES REV. JAMES DAVIS

UCJCI salutes Rev. James Davis, who died on January 23, 2021. A retired minister, Rev. Davis was Ordained in 1994, one of a pioneering group to pursue ministerial training via UCJCI's in-service training model conducted by the Institute for Theological and Leadership Development, one of the antecedents of the International University of the Caribbean.

Rev. Davis served the Brixton Hill Charge until his retirement in 2002. Prior to Pastoral Ministry Rev. Davis served as Director of the Mt Olivet Boys Home for twenty-one (21) years concluding in 1990. There he was influential in positively shaping the lives of many young men who passed through that institution.

May his soul rest in peace.

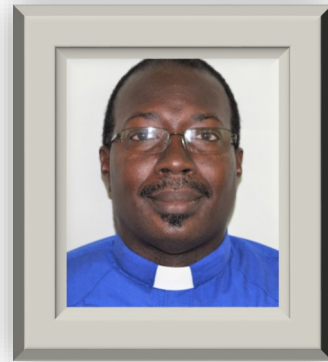


REMEMBERING MICHAEL WARING

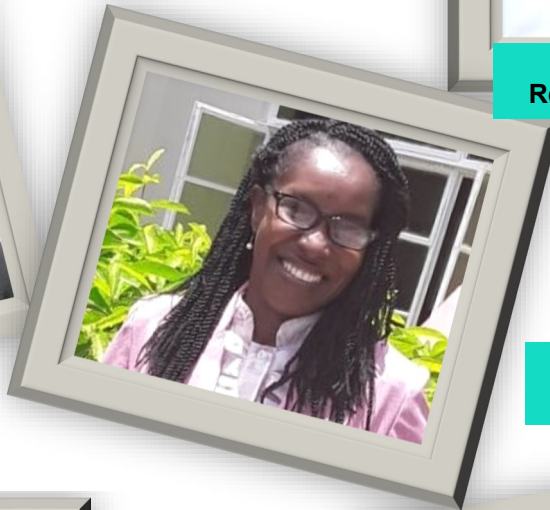

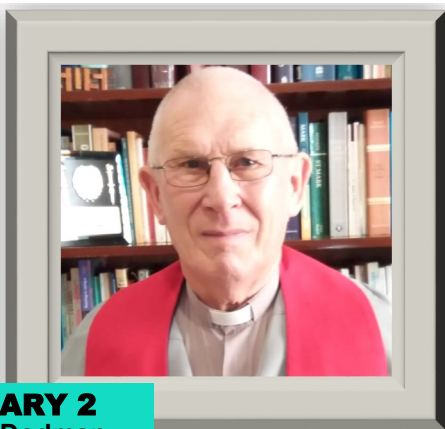
