Gender-based Violence

Time for the church to Recognise and Re-position



y earliest recollection of violence within families is an incident that I observed one Sunday afternoon when I was about nine years old. The commotion caused by the shouting and crying that emanated from my neighbours, alerted others in the community to peek through their windows or congregate on their verandas to get a first-hand view of Terrence and Wanda (not their real names) 'at it again'. I was just in time to see him pulling her by the arm down the forty-five-degree gravel driveway to the sounds of her pleading with him to let her go. She grabbed on to an overhanging tree limb (about the size of her arm) that gave way to the force of him pulling her. Halfway down the incline he suddenly let go of her, causing her to fall and skate a few feet before coming to a stop. Bruised and crying, she limped away. I couldn't understand why no one went over to assist her. A few weeks later I overheard two adults saving that they were back together again, and that Wanda had reported that Terrence only hits her because he loves her.

As I got older, I sadly learned that that kind of violence was not uncommon in domestic situations. There are far too many circumstances in which violence is meted out to one partner or the other or is used as a way of 'resolving' conflicts. Both men and women are victims of this kind of violence. However, women are disproportionally affected and are often the victims of violence in relationships simply by virtue of their gender and the beliefs and stereotypes associated with the power dynamics between men and women. Gender based violence is also distinguished from other types of domestic violence basically by what motivates it and the goals it aims to obtain. Hence, there are three basic elements that differentiate it from other forms of violence: its structural component, the goal of control and the isolation which it involves.

Gender-based violence is a form of 'structural violence' because it takes place under the construction of gender roles and sexual stereotypes. It is often fuelled by the notion that the man is inherently stronger, the leader and has the final word – that he has a 'right' to exert dominance over the woman.

It appears that the main aim of gender-based violence is to

control and subject women to the dictates and references imposed by the aggressor based on structural elements of society and culture.

As part of the strategy of control, the aggressor uses structural elements at a social level as well as individual control to isolate the women from her sources of external support (e.g., family, friends and other support systems).

The end result of gender-based violence is usually physical, sexual, psychological, or economic harm and suffering to

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women. No doubt, the lockdown (as a consequence of COVID-19 restrictions) has created the ideal conditions for the escalation of this kind of violence as women have experienced greater isolation (because of the formal confinement) making it more difficult for them to escape the violence. You might say, then, that the lockdown traps women in violence and frees their attackers to use it against them.

Unfortunately, the Church is not exempt from this experience of violence. Within our membership are victims, perpetuators and bystanders. The story of Jacob's Daughter, Dinah (in Genesis 34) gives us a glimpse into the age-old experience of genderbased violence. She is violently raped by Shechem ("the prince of the land") who uses his position of power to impose himself on her. When her father learned of the rape, although he was disturbed, he did not say anything for fear of his own safety. The rapist's father then went to her father and negotiated a dowry ("bride-price") to have her married off to her rapist. Sadly, her father accepts this proposition which was legally allowed for a rapist to make such a request (Deuteronomy 22:28-29; Exodus 22:16-17). Here we see a structure that allowed for and perpetuated this kind of violence against women, the exertion of control over a woman by a man by virtue of his gender and position and the further imposition of isolation by marrying her and placing her in the ambit of his greater control. In this story we see victim, aggressor and bystander. As in my first intro to this form of violence, there was a structure that gave support, there was control that was inflicted and isolation that was employed. And there was a victim, an aggressor and bystanders. The ministry of the Church must be geared towards victims, perpetuators and spectators for within our walls, all three are present.

Here are some issues to be considered.

To what extent are we perpetuating different standards for women than those expected of men? When women and girls are raped, there are many who pose ridiculous questions as, 'What was she doing alone in the night, why did she have to go out at that time?' or 'Why was she wearing that outfit?' as though she deserved

to be raped because of the crime of going out alone or wearing short shorts. Like in the story of the woman caught in the act of adultery, we must confront the propensity to place greater expectations of women in relationships. Where was the man with whom she was engaged in this act of adultery?

How can we help to break the cycles of violence by removing the stigma that encourages silence? Many persons remain in the shadows because they are embarrassed or ashamed and do not seek out help. Many bruises are masked with 'make-up' or stories of accidental 'tripping over a broom'. The story of Abigail

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(in 1 Samuel 25: 1-38) is an example of forbearing in silence and eventual speaking up. How do we empower victims and bystanders to do this important work?

What is the lesson to be learned from the inbuilt sense of balance and equality in the creation story? Unfortunately, the Church continues to be part of the problem in gender inequality by the beliefs and stereotypes we support. We must take note of the detail in the creation story where God created human beings -- male and female -- in God's 'own image' (Genesis 1:27). How will we care for each other so that she or he is treated as a beloved child of God, made in the image of the Creator?

The reality of gender-based violence is old and ongoing. The responsibility of Christians is to recognize its existence and reposition ourselves to become part of the solution by examining our beliefs, opening ourselves to others and living out our partnership with our sisters and brothers in Christ.

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Lead Us into The Unter Bible Study Word

When I came to Jamaica, I was always being encouraged to use the navigation system in the Nissan Toyota Tiida when driving to Kingston. Now, every time I drive to Kingston, I am reminded of how important it means to intentionally and seriously study the scriptures to keep us heading in the right direction. The scriptures help us to make corrections when we unintentionally, unconsciously lose our way.

The Lenten season is a very important time in the life of a Christian which pointedly directs believers to the redemptive works of Jesus Christ. It is a reflective prelude to the two most important celebrations on the Christian Liturgical Calendar - Good Friday and Easter.

During this time, attention is given to individual self-examination, penitence, devotion and spiritual renewal. The scriptures gives us the only glimpse available of Jesus as a child, as a 12 year old in the temple in Jerusalem, "sitting among the teachers, listening to them and asking questions" (Luke 2:46). The crowd was amazed at Jesus' knowledge of the Scriptures.

Jesus studied the Old Testament long before the New Testament came into effect. When the time came for him to be crucified, years later, he was ready as the Holy Spirit led him into the Wilderness to be tempted by Satan. Jesus had a storehouse of Holy Scriptures to strike and fight off every evil arrow Satan threw at him.

When the time came for him to leave his earthly life, while painfully and courageously enduring the agony of the crucifixion, Jesus' final words (Luke23:46b) came from a portion of Psalm 31:5: "Into your hands I commit my

spirit."

Jesus knew every part of the scripture and used it when the right time came. Many of us Christians (confessed believers) struggle to quote even a single scripture when we are faced with serious issues or asked to pray in church. Many fall short when it comes to serious and disciplined Bible study. The Bible is very central to our Christianity, but do we study it? Is it really our "mandate for faith and practice"?

You and I are disciples of Jesus Christ and its incumbent upon each one of us to follow the teaching of our Lord Jesus Christ and earnestly try to live the life He led while on earth. This means disciplined study of the Holy Scriptures and a disciplined life, adherence to Bible study times individually and with other Christians so that there is spiritual growth in our lives and this will help us leave the elementary teachings (Hebrews 6:1). The more we study the Holy Scriptures, the more transformed we become into his image (2 Corinthians 3:18).

Plan and concentrate on reading and studying of the Holy Scriptures this Lenten season. Take full advantage of the learning opportunities in your congregation and grow to maturity!!!! After Lenten Season, make studying the Holy Scriptures a lifestyle!!



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
