The first company formed outside of Europe was at Brownsville Presbyterian (now United) Church in 1923. The organization was actually Girl's Guildry as the movement was named in Scotland. The company in Jamaica was founded by Mrs. Brooks, wife of the Rev. Phillip Brooks, a Scottish Minister who came to Jamaica to work.

In 1949 the Rev. Madge Saunders (then Miss Madge Saunders) returned to Jamaica from the United Kingdom and took over the Girls Guildry in Jamaica as Organizing Training Officer.

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After School Programmes

After school programmes in UCJCI have traditionally been a means of supporting families by providing space, creative and helpful engagement of children in the hours after school before parents finish work. This has been pursued in different ways in various congregations. Some focus on homework assistance, others on play and others on furthering Christian nurture.

Savannah United Church in Grand Cayman is one such congregation which partners with parents through the Savannah After School Enrichment Programme (SASEP).



Homework is a key component of the SASEP programme, and is guided by qualified teachers in the primary school system

SASEP is in its twelfth year of existence and in 2020 suffered disruption all places. After the COVID 19 crises subdued in the Cayman Islands and the government gave the green light for schools and educational institutions to reopen, our resilient staff was determined to reopen our doors. We quickly advertised our 2020-21 academic year. However, by then some parents had made alternative arrangements, while others were apprehensive about the reopening and concerned about risk factors.

The church recruited a janitorial company to conduct a full sanitization exercise of the buildings. SASEP staff put protocols in place and sent out letters to parents. Our doors were open a few weeks in the school year and has remained so to date. The average attendance is 16. That is half or regular number over the years.



'Sovereign Lord, you alone know'. (Ezekiel 37:3).

Reflections on Pentecost

From the Cayman Regional Mission Council Weekly Update

Pentecost Sunday marks the end of the liturgical season of Easter and commemorates the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on the disciples, following the ascension of Jesus Christ into heaven. It is also recognized as the birth of the Church and the beginning of the Church's mission to the world.

In Acts 2:1-4 we read the following,

"When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place. Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. They saw what seemed to be tongues [flames] of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues[languages] as the Spirit enabled them."

This account of the outpouring of the Holy Spirit is rich in scriptural symbolism through the metaphors of wind and fire, both pointing beyond themselves to the presence of God's Spirit.

Wind

The wind represents God's breath that brings life and vitality. At the creation of the world, God breathed into the first human being, Adam, who came to life. In the prophet



Ezekiel's vision, God's breath/wind reanimates the dead bones. Here, in Acts 2:2 it is described as 'violent'. This translation is unfortunate because the word 'violent' has a negative connotation, suggesting something destructive and unwelcome. A better translation would be 'mighty' or 'forceful'. The Spirit of God came full of power and enabled the disciples to look beyond themselves and fulfill their mission, to present the good news of Jesus Christ to the world.

Fire

The tongues or flames of fire symbolize love/passion, purging, and light. We remember God speaking to Moses out of the burning bush. When the Israelites wandered through the

desert, they were guided during the night by a pillar of fire. The angel touched the prophet Isaiah's lips with a lump of burning coal when he received his commission. The purpose



of a burning oil lamp is to give light and not to be hidden. The presence of God's Holy Spirit indicates an irresistible and burning desire to be part of God's plan, to be in God's hands and be shaped, molded, and used according to God's will and for God's glory.

The 'mighty' wind and the flames of fire as symbols help us better understand and appreciate the purpose of the Holy Spirit in our lives and the ways He works in and through us.

Being filled with the Holy Spirit the potentials are unlimited!

What are we filled with?

Being filled with something means that our hearts and minds are being dominated by certain emotions or thoughts. It can be good or bad. It can be a momentary, short-lived experience or something that stays with us day after day, leaving a deep mark or impression on our being, on our behaviour, on our interactions with others, and our view and perspective on life. Let it be resentment, anger, envy, greed, worry, fear, uncertainty, or a dream, an enticing goal, a grand project - when they take hold of our life, it is usually not for the better. We suffer and as collateral damage, others suffer as well. Pentecost reminds us that it is not only good to be filled with God's Holy Spirit but even more, it is necessary, in order to be a fully committed disciple of Jesus Christ and to live our life for God's glory.

Being filled with the Holy Spirit is not a single event, but rather a continual, life-long process of spiritual growth and maturity. It is the result of submitting ourselves to the authority of the Holy Spirit, being shaped by the Word of God, walking in faith and obedience as He leads us. As the result, something truly amazing happens! We are slowly being conformed to Jesus' image and likeness in our human nature.




