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Impartiality: The Character of God

Please read Isaiah 35:4-7a and Psalm 146: 5-10

As the United Church in Jamaica and the Cayman Islands continues its focus on **PEACE**, we are provoked by two passages from the lectionary reading which invite us to recognize new ways of understanding creation and the nature of our relationship with the neighbor and the stranger. But more so, we are challenged to understand God's intention for creation, and we are called to discern God's will for how we ought to conduct ourselves as travelers along the journey of life.

God's providential care for creation and God's preferential option for the poor become obvious in the passages. It is evident also that by character and nature God is impartial and has a deep desire that humanity imitates this behavior. In being unbiased, God is able to embrace all and thereby seeks to provide benediction for everyone. Such is the nature of the God we serve.

Both the Psalmist and the writer of Proto-Isaiah point to an understanding of God whose impartiality eliminates disorder, discrimination, marginalization, and deprivation. God's help is available to heal the ailing creation and to help the socially and physically impaired because God is the 'creator of the heaven and earth, the sea and everything in them'. A peculiar reading of the text does make the call for the inclusion of humanity as a critical part if not the central prong of God's creation. However, whereas creation can be in total obedience to God and God has command over the wind and the rain, humanity's volition tends to cause defiance and disobedience. This attitude of defiance and disobedience to God is lived and manifested not only towards God but also towards fellow human beings. Further, creation groans because of the crippling actions of humanity towards the environment. Both texts invite us to re-examine our approach to creation and each other and for us to cultivate a deep desire for peace.

GOD TRANSFORMED CHAOS TO PEACE IN CREATION

Proto-Isaiah points to God who will come with power to execute retribution and to protect those who need to be rescued. The blind, deaf, lame, and mute will be able to participate fully in society as their ailment will cease. But more so, the harsh areas of nature will be transformed "Water will gush forth in

the wilderness and streams in the desert. The burning sand will become a pool, the thirsty ground bubbling springs. In the haunts where jackals once lay, grass and reeds and papyrus will grow".

The thorns and thistles (Genesis 3:18) that prevailed in the wilderness, which signified curse and devastation crowded creation with chaos. The attempt seems to have been the reversal of God's proclamation at the end of each day of creation that it was 'good'. Even though God sustains

creation, so often the uproar and disturbance would want to suggest the absence of God, however, the Bible is replete with God's restorative nature and power. Hence in the text from Proto-Isaiah, the wilderness gives way to water that quenches the thirsty land, streams are found in the desert, and pools of water in the burning sand. Grass, reeds, and papyrus can now flourish in places previously devasted and destroyed by wild beasts. The harshness and arid conditions are flooded with water divinely provided and transformation occurs.

Wilderness and desert now have the capacity to be fruitful and to provide shade and blessing for many. This transformation points to the fact that falsehood and evil can no longer defeat the goodness God intended for creation. Peace in creation and nature is established by the cathartic power of God. It is God's intention for peace to reign even where there seems to be no capacity or allowance for peace.

GOD TRANSFORMS HUMAN PLIGHT INTO PEACE

God not only created peace in nature but also according to the Psalmist, God has the desire and capacity to transform human plight to peace for those in the underbelly of the society. God proclaimed through the Psalmist that God will save, heal and restore those who are rejected by the structure of society.

Help and hope for the oppressed, hungry, prisoners, the blind, the bowed down, the foreigner, the fatherless and the widow can be found in God. Taking care of the most vulnerable in society seems to be the underlying thesis of Psalm 146. The circumstances of their vulnerability seem to beckon God into anger as God speaks of frustrating the way of the 'wicked', which implies that they, the wicked caused or created the stumbling block for those who cannot survive within the social context. God however lauds the 'righteous' and announces love for those who act righteously. God undoubtedly hears the cry of the distressed and the diseased and extends mercy beyond measure. The writer of Lamentation 3: 19 – 26 reminds us:

"I remember my affliction and my wandering, the bitterness and the gall. I well remember them, and my soul is downcast within me. Yet this I call to mind and therefore I have hope: Because of the Lord's great love we are not consumed, for his compassions never fail. They are new every morning; great is your faithfulness. I say to myself, "The Lord is my portion; therefore I will wait for him." The Lord is good to those whose hope is in him, to the one who seeks him; it is good to wait quietly for the salvation of the Lord."

PEACE IS OUR MANDATE

By extension, the Church and Christians are challenged to examine how we treat those who are disqualified by the standards of social, political, economic, and religious norms. So often we tend to disassociate ourselves from those who are the 'less' or the 'least' based on barriers which are social constructs. Too many persons are allowed to remain on the outside of acceptance while those who are the standard-bearers announce their preference and prejudice in remarkable ways.

We are called to follow God's attitude as the defender of the poor which was manifest in the incarnational presence of Christ among us – "For ye know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that, though he was rich, yet for your sakes, he became poor, that ye through his poverty might be rich." (2 Corinthians 8:9).

As we live through the pandemic, the issue of refugees, climate change, and the challenges to poorer nations, can we seek God's peace? Yes, we can, but the deeper question is - do we really want God's peace? This statement is made against the background that many who seek to control and dominate find it difficult to release and embrace the way God intended for us to do as human beings. We often fail to see God in Jesus Christ moving through church and community seeking for the ordinary people, those with little or no means, those for whom the doors of opportunity are closed, and those without influence and power. Jesus says, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me because he has anointed me to preach good news to the poor" (Lk 4:18).

Peace then, according to God's activity is the transformation of disorder into order. There are too many situations that exist where it is evident that the peace of God is absent. Such an absence lends itself to the crisis and chaos which can cradle destruction. When God's peace is present, war is mitigated, souls are satisfied, and life is lived to its fulness.
