Christmas Message 2021

Warm Christmas Greetings,

As we enter into the Christmas Season, we are invited to reflect



on the words the Apostle Paul wrote to the Colossians. Colossae was a thriving town in Asia Minor and was famous for the quality of the wool produced there. Although Paul may not have

visited Colossae, he earnestly wrote to them while he was in prison in Rome.

This was occasioned because of the false doctrine being taught by some persons regarding the incarnation of Christ, particularly that God was too holy to make contact with human flesh and remain undefiled. Further, it was being taught in the Church in Colossae that salvation would only be for those who completely observed the Mosaic law. Of particular interest to us is the pericope in Colossians 3:12-17 in which Paul enjoined the Colossian Christians to live according to God's expectation.

Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience. Bear with each other and forgive one another if any of you has a grievance against someone. Forgive as the Lord forgave you. And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity.

Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, since as members of one body you were called to peace. And be thankful. Let the message of Christ dwell among you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom through psalms, hymns, and songs from the Spirit, singing to God with gratitude in your hearts. And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him.

These words to the Colossians ought to remind us of our calling as a holy people and provide for us the guardrails for our faith. We are called to be a people filled with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience, forgiveness and love. The call is also one of unity, peace, wise teachings, and grateful hearts. This is a calling and requirement for the individual, the institutions of the family and church and the nation and especially so at this Christmas time.

The incarnational presence of Christ amid our human condition is the signal for us to live according to the divine example and precept. Christ's presence with us as the Babe in the Manger, His life and ministry and His death and resurrection provide for us the assurance of God's gracious favor and love for us as human beings.

Yet so often we tend to forget our high calling in Christ Jesus our Lord outlined in the text and if we are not careful we can easily plummet into thoughts and behavioral patterns that are contrary to this Pauline indication.

It is true that during 2021, as a nation, in the faith community, in our families and as individuals we all experienced moments of great blessings and simultaneously moments of deep concerns. In general, the context of our existence is still being viewed through the lens of the COVID-19 pandemic. For the first eight months of the year in the Cayman Islands, the COVID-19 pandemic was kept at bay and life appeared to be normal for most persons. Even for persons who were unemployed due to the pandemic, there was a sense of hope and persons were seeming to cope with their realities.

However, in the past four months with the increased community spread of the Delta variant and the introduction and rapid spread of the Omicron variant, some persons have become challenged by the realities of the disease, the isolation, the bereavement, and the uncertainty of the future direction of the pandemic. Our sincere prayers are the persons who have contracted the disease and with the families who have lost loved ones due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Beyond the general pandemic concerns, there are also some concerns being faced in the socio-religious context where the Church, and particularly our United Church in Jamaica and the Cayman Islands is having to pivot in the way we understand and undertake our ministry and mission. Congregational life has changed and will continue to change, and unfortunately, some persons have become disenchanted and as such, they have become reticent in attending worship services in person and online.

This change in the nature of our faith response, coupled with the exigencies of COVID-19 protocols have caused us to look long and hard at who we are as a community of believers and how we discern God's will and purpose for us as we exercise our faith and belief in God and as we exercise our ministry and mission here in the Cayman Islands.

This call from the Apostle Paul should serve as a reminder to

us that we are God's chosen people, and that the peace of Christ should reign in our hearts. The essence of the theology Paul expounded in the letter to the Church in Colossae included Christ's supremacy, His sufficiency and the need for Christians to be in service to Christ. This Christmas, more than ever, we need to underscore that we are committed to serving Christ and Christ alone, even as we respond to the realities around us.

Some of us may feel uncertain about how to serve with the new reality and tasks around us. Many feel inadequate to start afresh in responding to what the Lord demands of us today. So often the desire to "serve" God is according to our will and in our time rather than discerning God's time. God can and does interrupt our desires and comforts with new visions. We are reminded and encouraged to increase the trust we have and be assured that God is with us, Emanuel is with us, and today is God's time.

In the Cayman Islands Regional Mission Council, the expected changes being proposed in the realignment of the Charges may bring some discomfort but remember, we are serving Christ, not ourselves or those in ministry.

Changes are never easy or comfortable but, when we take into consideration the fact that we can no longer continue with a 'business as usual' mentality or seek to preserve our personal preferences, then let us prayerfully allow the Spirit of God to guide us in all our undertakings.

Let us at this Christmas time allow our fellowship with Christ to cause us to be faithful and fruitful as we bear each other up in prayer, with charitable deeds and kind words. May the words of Paul resonate with us this Christmas, 'Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, since as members of one body you were called to peace.'

The Cayman Islands Regional Mission Council is appreciative of the commitment, diligence and faithfulness with which the Congregants, Elders, Lay Pastors and Ministers have conducted the mission and ministry during 2021. May God continue to give to all servants grace, peace, good health and joy as you continue to share Christ's love in all you do.

May this Christmas be one of hope, peace, joy and love and may 2022 be a year of blessing for all of us.
