Going Further, Doing More



orld Council of Churches (WCC) is the most extensive and inclusive ecumenical movement organisation in the world. A movement that calls for Christian unity. Christians Unity is about cooperation and solidarity amongst Christians in issues relevant around the world. The WCC sees itself as an international venue for the promotion of such cooperation and solidarity.

What does WCC Believe?

The organisation's founding tenets are based on the members common acknowledgement of Jesus Christ's life and teachings and adherence to the Christian faith.

WCC makes a claim, "The WCC brings together churches, denominations and church fellowships in more than 110 countries and territories throughout the world, representing over 500 million Christians and including most of the world's Orthodox churches, scores of Anglican, Baptist, Lutheran, Methodist and Reformed churches, as well as many United and Independent churches. While the bulk of the WCC's founding churches were European and North American, today most member churches are in Africa, Asia, the Caribbean, Latin America, the Middle East and the Pacific. There are now 350 member churches."

WCC states that programmes are aimed at supporting

member churches while promoting justice and peace. This promotion of justice and peace finds its place in faith expression and programme areas of Unity, Mission and Ecumenical Relations, Public Witness and Ecumenical Formation. These programmes tackle issues such as strengthening relationships with member churches and ecumenical partners, spiritual life, youth engagement, inter-religious dialogue and cooperation and building a just community of women and men.

How has UCJCI participated in WCC?

It is natural that the UCJCI would have played its part in WCC as we have been a member church since 1967. Over these years members of our church have served the WCC in a number of capacities. We have played active roles in programmes and have hosted directly or have played significant leadership roles in major events such as 2011

In 2018, WCC celebrated 70 years of Ecumenical Partnership. Its Central Committee met under the Theme: "Walking Together Serving Justice and Peace" during the period June 15 – 21 in Geneva, Switzerland. The Pope Francis was in attendance to pay special tribute to the Council. Among the persons in attendance at this special central committee meeting were members of the United Church in Jamaica and the Cayman Islands. There were also members from other denominations and ecumenical groups in attendance.





PLANNING CONSIDERATIONS

The following are considerations when preparing for hurricanes.

- Identify immediately, an Emergency Action Marshall for each unit
- Ensure there is adequate supply of emergency contingency items:
 - Battery operated radio
 - Flashlights
 - ♦ Batteries
 - ♦ Plastic bags
 - > Tarpaulin
 - ♦ Tape
 - ♦ First-aid supplies
- Listen for hurricane watches and warnings.
- Ask your local Parish Disaster Coordinator about community evacuation plans.
- Establish facility shutdown procedures.
- Establish warning evacuation procedures which should include a roll-call using the attendance register, to ensure all employees are accounted for.

- Ensure Employee emergency contact information is current.
- Make plans to assist employees who may need transportation
- Make plans for communication with employees' families before and after a hurricane
- Keep battery-operated radio and battery backup for easy access.

Hurricane Watch

This occurs when:

- A hurricane is possible within 24 36 hours.
- Stay tuned for additional advisories.
- Tune to local radio and television stations for additional information.
- Be prepared to evacuate if this becomes necessary.

Hurricane Warning

This occurs when:

- A hurricane will hit land within 24 hours.
- Take precaution immediately.
- If advised evacuate immediately.

Steps to be followed when there is a hurricane warning:

- Survey your facility and make plans to protect outside equipment and structures.
- Make plans to protect windows.
 - Permanent storm shutters offer the best protection.
 - ♦ Covering windows with 5/8" marine ply-wood is a second option.
 - ♦ Tape over glass to reduce the effect of shattering.
- Consider the need for backup systems:
 - Operable pumps to remove flood waters.
 - ♦ Alternate power sources such as generators or gasoline-powered pumps.
 - ♦ Battery-Powered Emergency Lighting.
- Prepare to secure &/or remove records, computers and other valuable items within your facility to another safer elevated location and these should be stored using water proof material e.g. (plastic, tarpaulin etc.).
- Prepare for cessation of electricity supplies by turning off all main breaker switches.
- Turn off all cooking gas cylinders.

Deactivating the Contingency Plan

The Contingency Plan is to be de-activated once normalcy has been restored.

A thorough inspection of all property is to be conducted once normalcy has been restored. Report all loose and dangling electric wires to the power company. All damage sustained must be documented in detail and photographs taken of the damaged areas from different angles. A comprehensive report is to be submitted to the UCJCI Synod Office immediately to facilitate any insurance claim and/or other measures which may become necessary.
