MODERATOR'S MESSAGE UNION SUNDAY December 5, 2021

My Sisters and Brothers in Christ, I greet you warmly on this Union Sunday.

We pause each year on the 1st Sunday in December to reconnect with our history as a church; to celebrate our journey and witness, and to hear from God afresh as we live out our faith. We remember today the contributions of the Congregationalists, the Disciples of Christ and the Presbyterians to the Mission of Christ in Jamaica and the Cayman Islands.

We celebrate the fact that as a result of the movement of God's Spirit and the obedience of God's people, all three Denominations, over time, were able to find the will power to make the required changes and adjustments in their polity towards the greater witness of Christian Unity.

We are reminded of the words of the prayer of Jesus in St. John 17: 20-23, "My prayer is not for them alone. From Homeless to University Graduate

Tears streamed from her eyes midsmile when she walked the stage last Thursday at her graduation from the International University of the Caribbean that was held at Hope United Church. Shamoya Smith had a moment of immense gratitude when she received the Transformational Leadership Award for her years of outstanding service.

Smith credited her giving heart and selfless acts to countless rock bottom moments that motivate her to push through for others who may be facing difficulties, even if it requires her coming out of pocket.

Her mother, at the age of 15, had given Smith away just after birth to a Pastor who afforded her a very comfortable life as a child. However, the death of her mom when she eight sent her life into a tailspin that threw her on a journey of discovering her strengths. She was snatched from a stable home and placed into state care until custody was granted to her father and aunt.

Though she was faced with a series of child abuse and neglect bouncing between homes, she decided from very early that she would excel at everything she does and remained on the honor roll from primary school to the secondary level.

"I was 14 years-old and from I left his house, I never went back to live there", said the 21 year old explaining that her father evicted her from his Windward road dwelling in Kingston. Reminiscing on life with her dad, she expressed that their relationship gave her a blueprint of what not to do as a parent and forced her to learn how to survive life.

"I had to live with a church sister. His excuse was that I had demons and for other persons he told them I am disrespectful, when deep down I was just looking for somebody to love me for who I am, " she shared. At the time, she yearned for her father's approval and his permission for her to be proud of her own academic accomplishments.

The activist eventually went to live with grandfather in Mountain View, who passed away shortly after.

Despite the slew of challenges, she graduated Dunoon Park Technical High School with eight subjects that were fully paid for by the government, National Commercial Bank (NCB) and the Programme of Advancement through Health and Education (PATH). Smith was awarded scholarships to two universities and was also accepted to the University of the West Indies, Mona.

Admitting that she only learned of IUC when she was awarded the scholarship for her involvement and representation in co-curricular activities, she glistened with praises to God for having blessed her with that opportunity. The university paid 65 per cent of her tuition every year for four years.

"I did not know where the remaining 35 per cent was going to come from but I had faith," she said, sharing that she wrote countless letters, never took no for an answer and never stopped dreaming

and believing.

She continued serving through university in several activities. Smith expressed that over the four years, she found the most purpose in Circle K International at IUC, where she served as president for a year from March 2020 to 2021, and continues to be an active member of Kiwanis club.

Some of the initiatives carried out by Circle K under her leadership were the **Preemie Foundation Project** at the Victoria Jubilee Hospital where they donated supplies,
the feeding of 50 people in the Crossroads vicinity and partnered with the Kiwanis
Club for their annual Christmas treat that includes the feeding of the homeless.

"I went through University, four years of my life without paying a red cent," said Smith who graduated with a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration. She is now seeking employment and looking to start her master's degree at IUC.

She expressed deep gratitude to the persons she believed God strategically placed in her life that knew what she was going through, yet had confidence in her so she could dream and work towards to making it a reality.



Haiti Relief

At the last count, the death toll was 2,207, with 344 people still missing. The severe physical, economic and social impact on Haiti have been made more challenging as shortly thereafter they experienced the passage of Tropical Storm Grace. All of this follows the recent assassination of their President.

FFECTING CONGREGATIONAL LIFE IN

Cayman Islands

The number of COVID-19 cases in the Cayman Islands continues to rise. Of the 4,917 confirmed cases, 3,340 are active with 4 deaths and 21 persons in the hospital. The Cayman Government has responded with regulations aimed at controlling the spread of the virus, including but not limited, to protocols for travel and gatherings. Consequently, indoor gatherings, including church services, are now restricted to 100 persons. The restrictions are in place until November 22, 2021.

Jamaica

There are 90,341 confirmed cases of which 1,025 are active with 2,331 deaths. The Government of Jamaica, on November 16, 2021, announced amendments to orders under the Disaster Risk Management Act (DRMA). These provisions are for the period November 18 to December 9, 2021.

Please note and be guided by the following:

- 1. Church Services The number of persons allowed in the sanctuary for worship should be determined by the physical distancing requirement of a minimum of six feet between persons, but should not exceed 100 persons.
- 2. Weddings the maximum number of persons allowed is 100.
- 3. Funeral services are allowed with a maximum of 20 persons within the place of worship or facility.
- 4. Burials are allowed for 30 minutes Mondays to Fridays between 9 am and 4 pm with a maximum of 20 persons at the graveside.

The other relevant provisions remain the same as under:

- 5. No physical crusades, conferences or conventions will be permitted.
- 6. Physical Gatherings are limited to 10 persons.
- 7. Stay at home persons 60 years and over. Fully vaccinated persons are exempt.

Please note that the wearing of masks, hand sanitizing and social distancing are still required for public spaces and gatherings.




