It is with deep sadness that I inform you of the passing of Rev. Dr. Edmond Folkes, J.P., who made his transition earlier today after a brief illness.

Rev. Dr. Folkes was ordained to the Ministry of Word and Sacraments on July 8, 1964, and has exercised his call to ministry in a number of capacities within the United Church. He served as minister in the Askenish, Davyton and New Broughton Charges. He also served as Chairman of the former South Middlesex Area Council (now Southern Regional Mission Council), the Synod's Mission Witness and Service Committee and Chairman and member of the Board of Management of the Mt. Olivet Boy's Home.

At the community level he served as a Justice of the Peace, chaired and served on numerous school boards, taught at Bellfield High School and founded the Conference Centre of Project Ebenezer with skills training centres at Davyton, Williamsfield and Porus in Manchester.

Rev. Dr. Folkes was a model of servanthood as a pastor, leader and community builder. As a pastor he blazed a trail of compassion, care and commitment to the empowerment and evangelization of people. As a leader he demonstrated boundless energy and enterprise while leading congregations in establishing new congregations and in building programmes, Union and New Broughton, are two such among many others. As a community builder his contributions to offering relevant and contextual ministries within the communities he served are worthy of commendation.

He will be remembered in the UCJCI as a powerful preacher and evangelist, with a strong and effective ministry focus on boys and men. His disarming smile combined with a passion to engage others complimented his ministry of care and empowerment among people within community. These represent a rich and extraordinary legacy worthy of celebration.

We offer our deep condolence to his wife and partner in ministry, Dr. Auma, his biological sons, Albie and Elon and the 36 other children they adopted and raised.

We have lost a giant of the faith, may his soul rest in peace and light perpetual shine on him.

COVID-19 PROTOCOLS

AFFECTING CONGREGATIONAL LIFE IN JAMAICA AND

THE CAYMAN ISLANDS

Cayman Islands

The number of COVID-19 cases in the Cayman Islands since the start of the pandemic is 11,666. In addition, 14 COVID-19 patents have died as at midnight at Tuesday January 11. The Cayman Government has responded with regulations aimed at controlling the spread of the virus, including but not limited, to protocols for travel and gatherings. Consequently, indoor gatherings, including church services, are now restricted to 100 persons while outdoor gatherings are restricted to 250 persons.

Jamaica

There are 106,379 confirmed cases of which 11,427 are active with 2,506 deaths. The Government of Jamaica, on November 16, 2021, announced amendments to orders under the Disaster Risk Management Act (DRMA).

Please note and be guided by the following:

- 1. Church Services The number of persons allowed in the sanctuary for worship should be determined by the physical distancing requirement of a minimum of six feet between persons, but should not exceed 100 persons.
- 2. Weddings the maximum number of persons allowed is 100.
- 3. Funeral services are allowed with a maximum of 20 persons within the place of worship or facility.
- 4. Burials are allowed for 30 minutes Mondays to Fridays between 9 am and 4 pm with a maximum of 20 persons at the graveside.

The other relevant provisions remain the same as under:

- 5. No physical crusades, conferences or conventions will be permitted.
- 6. Physical gatherings are limited to 10 persons.
- 7. Stay at home persons 60 years and over. Fully vaccinated persons are exempt.

Please note that the wearing of masks, hand sanitizing and social distancing are still required for public spaces and gatherings.

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
