

## Feelings: Is Love a Feeling?

I remember as a small boy switching off as soon as I heard a preacher start speaking about love. I had no idea at that age what 'love' was! As I have become older, I have increasingly come to realise that many still have little idea! At least, as to what true love is.

The word love in the English language has many sides to it. It was CS Lewis who pointed out that our one English word covers four Greek ones. There is eros which indicates romantic or sexual love, philia speaks of brotherly love and friendship, and storge of affection or family love. God is the source of love, whatever form it takes. The problem is that sinful human nature so often twists and spoils it. We have misused and exploited it so that it has become something which may hurt and harm. Very often it ends up as simply selfishness - self-love.

The fourth is a word which was rarely found in contemporary literature of Bible days, let alone understood by those societies, but one found throughout the New Testament. It is agape. Its best expression is found in I Corinthians 13 where the King James Version calls it "charity" – but it is not charity as we usually think it. It is the love that God shows to us and which he commands us to show to others. It is self-giving love.

So, to the title: Is love a feeling? The answer is yes - and no! When we think of agape in particular, its basis is not in feelings. It has to do with acts of selflessness.

Last month, I stated that "the foundation of our faith is not our feelings but its unchanging truth, and that our relationship with the Lord is not based on how we are feeling at any one time ..." That is true of agape, too. Our love for God is not just something emotional. Nor should our love for others be based on how we feel towards them. Our love for God is a determination to honour him in everything. Our love for others will be seen in our commitment to their well-being.

How do you "love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength" (Mark 12:30)? Undoubtedly, feelings are involved, but these are not foundational. Listen to Jesus' answer: "If you love me, keep my commandments" (John 14:15). He said similarly a few verses later: "Anyone who loves me will obey my teaching" (v. 23). This is the bottom line when it comes to loving God: it is not following our emotions but keeping his commandments. Obeying his teaching. It is an act of will. It has to do with our behaviour, our speech and our attitudes. It is doing God's will however we feel. So, when we sing in church songs like "I love you, Lord", we need to remember that we are expressing something more than nice warm feelings towards him.

The reverse must also be made clear: Any action which is not the will of God, is not true love. Disobedience to God is unloving.

And what about the next part of the command: "Love your neighbour as yourself" (v. 31)? First, note that these two instructions come together. You cannot truly love your neighbour in the way Jesus meant it unless you love God first. Second, the 'loving ourselves' in this context means we wish the best for ourselves. This is what Jesus is instructing us for others: we must seek their good regardless of how we feel about them. We may positively dislike them! Hence Jesus said we were not only to love our neighbours but to love our enemies, too (Matthew 5:44).

This kind of love often comes with a cost in emotional energy. time, personal comfort and, sometimes, to our reputation. It can be painful. We can be misunderstood and rejected.

And, by the way, don't forget that your husband or wife is your neighbour, too! So are your kids.

We shouldn't waste time deciding how we feel about our neighbour, whether we 'love' them or not; we are to act as though we did. When we behave as if we love someone, we may surprise ourselves to find that we actually come to love them!

As I indicated last month, I don't want to be misunderstood! Of course, there are feelings in a loving relationship. But mere emotions cannot and must not be love's foundation whether it is in human relationships or our love for God.

So, when we come to church, we can worship God even when our feelings are not upbeat and we don't feel particularly loving You can listen to United In Faith episodes at towards him. And our worship can and should continue when we leave church and live lives of obedience to him out in the world. It will include loving our neighbours. This is truly loving God. Michael Bowerman

#### What is Monkeypox Disease?

A rare disease that is caused by an infection from the monkeypox virus

#### How is the Monkeypox virus transmitted?

It can be transmitted from animals to humans through:

- bites or scratches by an animal carrying the virus handling and eating meat from infected animals

It can be transmitted from human to human through close contact with:

- skin lesions e.g. rash, blister, sores, scab, etc

- body futures droplets from respiratory secretions e.g. cough, sneeze, spit recently contaminated objects e.g. bed linen, clothes and frequently touched areas

#### What is the incubation period?

The incubation period (time between infection and when the symptoms start) is usually from 6 to 13 days but can range as 5 to 21 days

#### What are the main signs and symptoms?

- Fever Chills Intense Headaches Extreme Exhaustion
- Muscle ache and Backache Swollen lymph nodes
   Rash (usually appears 1-3 days after the fever)

Symptoms can be mild or severe and associated skin rash can be itchy or painful

#### What is the treatment for Monkeypox Disease?

Treatment is based on the symptoms. If experiencing fever or pain, Panadol can be taken Drink lots of fluids to maintain hydration

#### Who is at risk of being infected with the Monkeypox virus?

Any person in close contact with someone who has monkeypox

#### How can the risk of getting Monkeypox be reduced?

Key prevention measures include COVID-19 prevention measures:

• Wear your mask • Wash your hands • Physical Distance
 • Frequently sanitise areas that are frequently touched • Avoid crowds









#### Is there a Vaccine for Monkeypox?

• There is a vaccine against monkeypox that is generally available. A recently approved vaccine has been produced for research purpose only

Jamaica has no known case of monkeypox at this time.
