

RECONNECT WITH THE RISEN CHRIST

To this point of your life, what is your story?

What is the nature and texture and pattern of the life you have lived to this point? What have been the highpoints and low points, the celebrations and the struggles you have and or enduring?

On this Easter Sunday we all have a story to tell. The resurrection story highlights two things which, when they are a feature of the human story, render the human spirit and will powerless. We find them in the varied ways in which the gospels portray the resurrection events, on this day we label Easter Sunday: doubts and fear.

When you have doubts about life, about the integrity and the commitment of others (leaders, friends, family, spouse), doubts about the ability of a system or an institution to function effectively, you lose confidence in yourself, in others and in that institution.

When you live with or live in fear, it immobilizes you, it consumes you and ultimately controls you to the extent that you are unable to discern and identify the possibilities around and within you.

When you combine doubt with fear the result is a combination of distress, despair and hopelessness. What story about your life and circumstances do you bring to this Easter Sunday/Resurrection Sunday Service, this morning? If you have studied the narratives in the Gospels, you will find a common thread in the details of the accounts among the presence of the women, the stone being rolled away, the empty tomb, Jesus' interaction with and declaration to the women and the interaction of the women with the disciples. In each account doubts and fear feature.

Matthew's account offers us a kind of template to not only overcome the doubts and fears of life and living but to equally to connect and reconnect with the Risen Christ. For Matthew, the resurrection of Jesus was the decisive event in human history for it paved the way for Resurrection faith, indeed for Matthew the resurrection is the rock upon which the entire gospel stands. Critically, Matthew declares that this resurrection faith is not grounded in what you have seen or heard about the Risen Christ, indeed the disciples saw and heard and others heard as well but they did not believe. No, it is not what you have seen or heard, whether through videos or plays or via sermons or reading scriptures, rather it is how you have encountered and experienced the risen Christ to the point of belief!

For Matthew it is the risen Christ who enables us to overcome our doubts and fears, for it is the risen Christ who replaces the doubts with confidence and the fear with faith in God, who has the ability to transform and renew our lives and living!

RECONNECT WITH THE RISEN CHRIST

ITo reconnect with the Risen Christ requires: Consciousness

The consciousness Matthew wishes for us to have about the Risen Christ, is that while the Easter story has many perspectives and facets and versions, while each has its own focus and emphasis, while each present with a different texture and fabric, all declare that the tomb is empty, that Jesus is no longer dead and in the grave but risen and alive!

We don't' need to harmonize our stories, your testimony and mine will sometimes be radically different but we can all testify to the connection we have the Risen Christ, who helps us to write and rewrite our stories! Truth: We are not all alike! But we all have access to the Risen Christ

When we reconnect to the Risen Christ we are assured of: Companionship

What strikes me about Matthew's account is that the women, having encountered the natural, the supernatural, the guarded and empty tomb, the new instructions about Galilee for the disciples, hurried from the tomb, afraid yet, filled with Joy!

In the midst of the contradiction of fear and joy, Jesus appears to them and offers them companionship in two critical ways. Firstly, He offers His presence. This was confirmation that neither the earthquake, nor the guards, nor the angels, nor any other force had removed his body from the tomb, he was indeed risen! Secondly, he offered comforting words, do not be afraid! Truth: We are not alone! As we travel along the contradicting and perplexing path called life, Jesus comes alongside us and offers us companionship!

To reconnect to the Risen Christ demands of us: Commitment

We know well a significant contradiction of the Resurrection, it was women, considered of lower status than men at the time, who were both the first witnesses to the empty tomb and the first to see the risen Christ. More critically, culturally, women were not allowed to testify in court and so their witness was not considered credible.

The Resurrection story is a constant reminder that despite our stories, despite how they have played out, and dare I say it, despite how others read or interpret our stories, God can, does and will use any of us to accomplish God's will. Truth: We have work to do!

As we seek to live out the stories which point to our connection with the Risen Christ, let us remember that we are not all alike, we are not alone and we have work to do.

Synod worship committee gives the background to planned worship events

Motif: MOVEMENT MAIN SYMBOL: SHIP

If ever there was a time in human history that the Church must be a relevant community of Hope and Life, it is now. The hope-stifling and life-threatening realities of our times are many: fractured homes, congregations, and relationships; abused men, women and children.

It is a time of mental, emotional, and spiritual fragmentation and depression, as persons struggle for stability in a world changed by the onslaught of the Covid 19 pandemic. Value-principles that served previous generations are being challenged by a culture of new thought, creating alternative life-styles that not only contend for their space in the social arena, but contest the doctrines of the Christian Faith.

Institutions that were once regarded as bastions of hope and guidance, and in which was reposed the confidence of many, are experiencing a deficit in public Technological advancement has served well to increase awareness and connection with each other making the world a global village, but it has also been manipulated to invade privacy and aid in sophisticated criminal activity.

Medical science works hard to develop new interventions for the combating of increasing illnesses, and world leaders struggle to bring equilibrium to the socio-economic and political instability of our times. Many persons are fearful about the future.



Our world needs a voice and a vehicle to help it navigate the swirling waters of our days and lead us into a viable future, God's future. This is the assignment of the Church of Jesus Christ.

The theme for Synod 2023 ROOTED, RESILIENT: RE-IGNITED BY THE SPIRIT is relevant for our Church. It is the RE-IGNITING of the Holy Spirit that will keep the Church anchored and agile in her calling. Scripture shows that each time the Spirit of God re-ignites the people of God, they move from a state of malaise to Mission-engagement. They become a MOVEMENT.

Our United Church, re-ignited by the Holy Spirit, will express herself and be experienced as a MOVEMENT. That will serve as the motif for our Synod Services...MOVEMENT.

As a Church, governed and guided by the Holy Spirit, we are making forward MOVEMENT. We are committed to transition out of the spiritual malaise deepened by the Covid 19 Pandemic, to Mission-engagement.

SYNOD AT WORSHIP

Like the Early Church we must eagerly WANT the re-igniting of the Holy Spirit. Like them we must prayerfully WAIT for the out-pouring of the Holy Spirit who comes with transforming power to revive both the souls of believers and the systems of the Church. Like them we must WALK in the way of the Spirit guided by God's Word.

To that end we will be the safe and sustaining community, a SHIP (ark), to navigate the waters of the times, helping persons to find safe harbour in our LORD JESUS CHRIST and the community He calls to himself.

As such the symbol on which the motif will rest is that of "A SHIP"

In theology and architecture, the Church has often been referred to as a Ship, reminiscent of the family of Noah and representatives of the created order's traverse upon the tumultuous tides (Genesis 6-8).

Jesus in his ministry used boats as the vehicles for his work of mission. Our Caymanian sisters and brothers will provide "cat boats' for the Synodical experience as representations of the motif's symbol.

Further, the services will feature focus points containing elements representative of the Holy Spirit's work within the Church and world; namely: Oil, water, wind, and fire.

When the Holy Spirit's oil fires up the Engine of the Ship of the Church, and the Wind of the Holy Spirit fills the sails of the SHIP of the Church; and the Water of the Holy Spirit carries the SHIP of the Church, then we will see renewal and revival in our WorSHIP; FellowSHIP; DiscipleSHIP; LeaderSHIP; and StewardSHIP (of unsaved souls, our selves, and substance).






