the World Council of Churches (WCC) is celebrating its 75th anniversary.

This anniversary is "a stepping stone toward the future, representing an opportunity to share what the WCC offers spiritually as an organization for future generations."

"In the larger picture, the 75thanniversary commemoration will help the world see the WCC as a platform that brings Christians together even in very difficult times, different Christians helping in situations to see the world from the perspective of others, to show compassion for one another, and to build trust as a vital part of the ecumenical journey."

As a member of the WCC, the United Church in Jamaica and the Cayman Islands joins in the celebration and remains committed to the ecumenical ideals of unity, respect, and cooperation among different Christian denominations and traditions, and to the cause of interreligious dialogue.

The WCC is a fellowship of 350 member churches in more than 110 countries and territories throughout the world, representing over 500 million **Christians and** including most of the world's **Orthodox churches**, scores of Anglican, **Baptist**, Lutheran, **Methodist** and Reformed churches, as well as many United and Independent churches.

AUGUST 31 CELEBRATORY EVENT – BLACK LEADERS' CONTRIBUTIONS IN WCC'S HISTORY

'They too were Gathered'

A public online celebration and panel discussion on 31 August, "They too were Gathered: Paying homage to Black people's contributions to 75 years of World Council of Churches (WCC)," will uncover the contributions of Black people from different parts of the world in the formation and growth of the WCC.

While the participation of white Europeans and possibly North Americans has never been questioned in the history of the formation of the WCC, questions have been asked as to the role played by Black people, as well as people from Africa or in the diaspora in the history of the WCC.

In 1948, the WCC was already acknowledging that there was a "race problem" in the world, including in churches in which the white supremacist ideology was impacting the Christian ideals of a healthy community. The WCC's commitment to the humanity, dignity, and rights of Black people was further highlighted and strengthened in the launch of the Programme to Combat Racism in 1969 following the WCC 4th Assembly of 1968.



the WCC celebrates 75th As its anniversary, one question and observation demands an answer: what has been the contribution of Black people to the rise and continued existence, even thriving of the WCC? Due to the influence and persistence of colonial ideology and culture, part of the history of the WCC has not escaped from the whitewashing of positive contributions with blackness reduced in visibility and significance.

Among the questions that will guide the conversation and celebration are "What was the contribution of Black people to the formation and launch of the WCC and who were some of the leading individuals?" and "Who have been some of the Black stalwarts of the WCC from 1948 to the present?"

The event will aim to recover the legacy of Black contributions and to reimagine future Black contributions to the health and wellbeing of the WCC.

The supplies were backpacks, lunch kits, water bottles, pencil cases and gift vouchers for the students supported by the Crisis Centre.


These gifts were made possible by donations from members of the nine (9) United Church Congregations in Grand Cayman, coordinated by the MAT member in each congregation.

At the 42nd Synod of the United Church in Jamaica and the Cayman Islands, held in April 2021, the Peace Initiative was introduced. Each Regional Mission Council was asked to identify a project. The Cayman Islands Regional Mission Council (CIRMC), at its October 8, 2022, meeting chose the Cayman Islands Crisis Centre as its Peace Initiative project.

Using Faith to transform lives


