Council for World Mission's premier youth mission training programme is back in Jamaica after some 28 years. A group of seven young adults arrived in Jamaica for six weeks as part of their programme towards the award of a Diploma in Mission Studies.

CWM equips young people for ministry and mission through a 6-month long programme of exposure and engagement in mission in a variety of ways. The programme involves intensive mission training including an action-reflection model of learning. So far over 350 young people from CWM member churches and mission partners have participated over the 42 years of TIM.

Placing emphasis on 'a new practical and radical understanding of what witnessing to Christ means', the programme hinges on the self-understanding of the young people as

"envoys' of the whole CWM fellowship of churches through one member church to another.

THE PROGRAMME

TIM enables exposure and involvement in risk areas of mission in the community. To a great extent, this is the heartbeat of TIM. It is here that all the different elements are drawn together and given concrete expression. The academic element of the programme will focus on Peace-building, Resiliency and Wellness offered through the International University of the Caribbean.

CWM states that, "We are helped to bring about the birth of 'new eyes' and 'new ears', new ways of understanding and of demonstrating solidarity with the joys and sorrows of people. By immersing into the daily struggles of people, we learn about the costliness of mission action. The curriculum design assumes that it is risk failure better to than noninvolvement in the daily struggles of people seeking justice, peace and fullness of life".

TIM IS BACK IN JAMAICA CONT'D

While in Jamaica, the TIM participants will also be exposed to the contexts of ministry of the United Church through the regions in Jamaica. They have spent time in the Western Region and are currently in the North Eastern Region.

THREE MAIN DIMENSIONS TO THE TRAINING IN MISSION LEARNINGFRAMEWORK:

- Study and reflection: aimed at increasing participants' capacity to identify and understand current mission issues.
- Work in placements: aimed at enabling participants to involve themselves with the joys and sorrows of people in local communities and develop action-oriented skills.
- Group dynamics: aimed at promoting growth in understanding others and oneself, by living and working with people of other cultures.

WHO CAN BE A PART OF TIM?

TIM is open to young adults with Christian maturity and a sense of adventure and discovery. TIMs are usually emerging leaders, recognised by their denominational churches as having particular potential for serving in mission settings in or on behalf of their home church. designed to TIM is nurture and form missional leaders who will live a missionoriented life, serving in a variety of capacities in the decades ahead of them. Many TIMs go on to have varied careers in church and mission work or in qlobal development settings.

"EARLY DETECTION SAVES LIVES"

This message continues from last week's Update as the issue of Breast Cancer Awareness was tackled by Rev. Rohan Forrestor in his message at William Pouchie Memorial United Church on October 15, 2023.

BREAST CANCER TOUCHES OUR STATUS

And a woman was there who had been subject to bleeding for twelve years (Mark 5:25 NIV)

This woman's condition meant that she was considered religiously unclean and anyone who touched her would be considered unclean. Her condition meant she could not bear children. Therefore, she lost a lot of the status and respect women had in that society. Some things should not be, but sometimes breast cancer brings a stigma. Maybe it is the physical toll of chemo and radiation. Maybe it is the appearance of the cancer itself. Some breast cancer patients feel as if folks treat them as if their condition is contagious. Extraordinarily sad are those would say that your cancer is the result of some kind of sin in your life for which you are being punished or the number of sexual partners we've had or that, if you just had enough faith God would heal you. Breast cancer really brings out some ugly aspects of societal perception of those with breast cancer. These things often challenge and seek to redefine the status and image we portray in society before and after a diagnosis.

One of the products of cancer is the love of relationships. Helping hurting people brings out the best in us. It shakes up our priorities, reminds us that the greatest things in life are not things, but those who are integral to our life and living in community.

BREAST CANCER TOUCHES OUR FINANCES

She had suffered a great deal under the care of many doctors and had spent all she had, yet instead of getting better she grew worse. (Mark 5:26 (NIV)

This verse should not be seen as an indictment against first century doctors. Instead, we should imagine for a moment that they were doing the best they could with what they had and understood various illnesses.

The truth is, medical treatments are expensive, especially cancer. Even if you have good insurance, the out-of-pocket expenses are formidable. Many are not able to mammogram that aids in early detection, because of cost.

BREAST CANCER TOUCHES OUR STRENGTH

She had suffered a great deal under the care of many doctors and had spent all she had, yet instead of getting better she grew worse. (Mark 5:26 NIV)

We should never miss the phrase..." she grew worse." Breast cancer can take away all your physical abilities. It can do a lot of terrible things to us physically. In addition, breast cancer patients know well that in facing their disease they can get worse before they get better.

The effects of chemotherapy and radiation can, at times, seem worse than the disease itself. They would never choose that battle. But they face it daily. It is the greatest physical challenge and stands above other physical, financial, emotional accomplishments of a life.

BREAST CANCER CANNOT TOUCH OUR FAITH

When she heard about Jesus, she came up behind him in the crowd and touched his cloak, because she thought, "If I just touch his clothes, I will be healed." (Mark 5:27-28 NIV) Remember that Jesus affirmed that it was the woman's faith that made her well.

Without faith it is impossible to please God (Hebrews 11:6a). Let us not get the idea that sickness is due to a lack of faith. The truth is, faith is not the utopia of the mountain top. Faith is moving forward in the grind. It is often in the battle that our faith strengthens. Eventually this lady died of something. We can cheat death. However, we can only beat death through Christ. It is about maintaining a steadfast faith and trust in God, even when answers to our prayers seem to be delayed. It is about understanding that God's timing is perfect, even when it does not align with our own. The woman in the story exemplifies this kind of steadfast faith and trust in God in Christ.

Despite the delay in her healing, she never lost faith. She continued to believe in the possibility of her healing, and when she heard about Jesus, she saw an opportunity and seized it.

Today, I encourage anyone who has been diagnosed with breast cancer and wondering what to do or begin treatment, do not lose faith. Like the woman in the story, just touch Jesus with your faith.

Rev. Wray led the devotion on the topic, 'This is my Worth-ship,' accompanied by the Praise Team and music from Mr. Noel Wallace. Rev. Wray challenged the audience to take a step back and reflect on the basics of our faith and the importance of worshipping God as the One who is worthy.

Keynote Speaker, Rev. The Myers introduced 1 Corinthians 14: 15-16 and summarized worship as 'Action-Reaction-Revelation-Response'. This simple framework helped the audience understand better the dynamic relationship between us and God.






