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Rooted and Resilient: Re-ignited by the Spirit to Re-connect

Jesus High and Lifted Up

Please read John 3:14 -18.

Many people in our world today are expressing unbelief, sarcasm about faith in God and even utter rejection of a need to believe in God. The passage for reflection is Jesus' response to Nicodemus, a Pharisee, who was perplexed and doubtful when Jesus answered him. The response highlighted Nicodemus' unbelief and referred to his need to be "born again" meaning a spiritual rebirth. Jesus proceeded to quote from Numbers 21: 4 -9, verses of scripture Nicodemus would have been familiar with.

"...as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness even so must the Son of Man be lifted up that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have eternal life." (NKJV)

Let us examine **four** teachings Jesus conveyed and wants us to know from John chapter 3 and His reference to Numbers 21.

First, Jesus teaches that He is the Son of Man and God

Jesus responded to Nicodemus by twice referring to Himself as the Son of Man. Baker's Dictionary of Theology says the term Son of Man is quoted in the book of Daniel and meant "a heavenly figure, both an individual and an ideal representative of the people of God." It was important that Nicodemus believe that Jesus came down from heaven and therefore could speak of heavenly truths, although Nicodemus would not understand. Today, we have Jesus' words in the Bible that reveal heavenly truths that He wants us to know.

However, in his unbelief, Nicodemus lacked faith in God. Hebrews 11:6 tells us "Without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he who comes to God must believe that He is ..." We must come in faith believing Jesus is God, and He became Man in the flesh. It should be noted that Jesus was not turned off by Nicodemus' lack of faith, instead, He gave him His full attention, started His response with that which Nicodemus (a teacher) already knew about early Jewish history and testified to the truth that He is God.

Secondly, Jesus teaches about God's judgment verses God's mercy.

Jesus uses the passage Numbers 21:4-9 as a picture of God's judgment and condemnation of sin. It is a story of the rebellion of the children of Israel against Moses and God. They lacked belief by doubting that God's deliverance was right for them. Although they saw how God had kept them in their journey through the wilderness, the people, frustrated and boisterous, resorted to their favorite complaint crying, "Why have you taken us up from Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and our soul loathes this worthless bread." (Numbers 21: 5). In judgment for their unrighteousness, God sent fiery serpents which bit them, and many died. Ps. 107 vs. 17 -18 seems to refer to such a scene, stating because of their transgressions or sins against God, they "drew near to the gates of death." Our unbelief in God, because of our sin nature, make us deserve God's judgment.

Yet the passage in Numbers is also a picture of God's mercy, that brings healing. As the people suffered, they cried out to Moses. In repentance, they acknowledged "we have sinned for we have spoken against the Lord and against you, pray to the Lord that He take away the serpents from us." Moses prayed and was instructed to make a bronze serpent, put it on a pole and lift it up; for when those who are bitten look up at it, they would be healed. The people who believed looked up at the bronze serpent and were physically healed. Ps. 107 vs 19 states "Then they cried out to the Lord in their trouble, and He saved them out of their distresses." Many can testify about crying out to God and receiving His mercy and healing.

Thirdly, Jesus teaches that the Son of Man must be lifted up.

In the Numbers passage the bronze serpent was put on a pole for the people to look up. According to Jesus it was a foretelling picture of the Son of Man being lifted. When Jesus said, "as Moses lifted *up the serpent*," it is believed that Jesus was alluding to His earthly betrayal and death on a cross, which was a stake used for cruel punishment by the Greeks and Romans. It resulted in much mourning by His followers but as the bronze serpent on the pole had brought physical healing to the people, so Jesus became our Saviour, taking our unrighteousness by being in anguish, pain and death as experienced by those bitten by the serpent. That was His payment for the penalty of our sins, so that He secured spiritual healing which Nicodemus and all humanity needed. Now, we look up not to a serpent on a pole for healing and mercy but to Jesus.

Fourthly - Jesus is God's expression of love and grace.

By the Son of Man, the Father Almighty extended to us the hand of grace. Verse 16 is highly regarded as God's expression of this divine love. It says that "God so loved that He gave His only begotten Son so that whosoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life." This liberating word of love that changes the heart declares with certainty that whoever believes receives eternal life, that is, they are saved.

Jesus then stated in verse 17, "For God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world but that the world through Him might be saved." Anyone throughout the world who believes in the Name of Jesus - the Son of Man and repents of sin as did the people in Numbers, is not condemned, but receives the free gift of salvation, that is, God's grace. Ephesians 2: 8 & 9 says "For by grace you have been saved through faith and that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God, not of works, lest anyone should boast."

God's grace is available for spiritual rebirth, consider making the decision to accept this free gift of salvation by surrendering and acknowledging your wrongs and unbelief.

Jesus wants us to know that He was lifted up on the cross but was also lifted high in glory. Philippians 2: 9 says in returning to the Father in glory, Jesus was *"highly exalted and given a name above every name."* This same Jesus promised that He will prepare a place for us so that someday where He is we will also be there. The glorious news is that Jesus was lifted up so that He would redeem and lift us up to glory with Him.

If you do not know Jesus, will you believe that He can give you spiritual and physical healing today? As you read, embrace this prayer as your own, 'Jesus I believe that you died for my sins, I repent of sins and accept you as my Lord and Saviour. Come into my heart today I pray. Amen'.

May the blessings of God our Father, Jesus the Son and His Holy Spirit be yours always.
