

# GOOD FRIDAY FEATURE REFLECTION- THE PIERCED HAND

**'I** am the resurrection and the life, whoever believes in me, though he die, yet shall he live; and everyone that lives and believes in me, shall never die. Do you believe this?'

Go with me for a moment to witness what was perhaps the foggiest night in history. The scene is very simple. You will recognise it quickly, a grove of twisted olive trees, ground cluttered with large rocks, a low stone fence and dark, dark night. Now look into the picture, look closely through the shadowy foliage. See that solitary figure, flat on the ground, face stained with dirt and tears, fists pounding the hard earth; eyes, wide with a stupor of fear, hair matted with salty sweat. Is that blood on his forehead?

"O Father, this cup is bitter! This cup is so bitter! Abba Father, nothing is impossible with you. You can let this cup pass. Nothing is impossible with you. But God, it's not my will, it's not my will. Your will, whatever is Your will!"

That's Jesus, Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane. Maybe you have seen the classic portrait of Christ, kneeling beside the big rock, snow white robe, hands peacefully folded in prayer; a look of serenity on his face, a halo over his head. The painter didn't use the Gospel of Mark as a pattern when Mark wrote about that painful night. He used phrases such as these: 'Horror and dismay came over him'; 'My heart is ready to break with grief', and 'He went forward a little and threw himself on the ground'.

"Him tek di cup an seh, da wine ya a di new promise wheh God mek wid mi blood wheh a go pour out fi unoo. But look, di one wheh a go sell mi out de right a di table wid wi. A di one mi a go gi da piece a bread ya afta mi dip it inna di bowl. When him dip di bread inna di bowl him gi it to Judas Iscariot, Simon bwoy pickney. Same time Judas tek di bread so, Satan tek ova him 'art."

Mark used black pains to describe the scene. We see an agonising, straining and struggling Jesus. We see a man of sorrows. We see a man struggling with fear wrestling with commitment and yearning for relief.

### We see Jesus in the fog of a broken heart.

The next time the fog finds you, remember Jesus in the garden. The next time you think that no one understands or cares, re-read the 14th chapter of Mark and pay a visit to Gethsemane. And the next time you wonder if God really perceives the pain that prevails on this dusty planet, listen to him pleading among the twisted trees. The next time you are called to suffer, pay attention. It may be the closest you will ever get to God. Watch closely. It could very well be that the hand that extends itself to lead you out of the fog is a pierced one.

### **A LETTER FROM HAITI**

### My UCJCI Family



You are praying and the Lord is saying "Let not your heart be troubled...." St Jn 14v1

Thanks for your prayers and love.

Joan and Jean Allemand I am so blessed to be a part of such a cloud of witnesses, supporters and prayer warriors. At the outset I wish to thank you for your thoughts, prayers and concerns over the years but especially at this crucial time.

I am not in active service at this time having retired 4 years ago, but I still visit the clinic where I do cancer screening. I am also active in the church with the Women's Ministry and Goodnews Club with the children.

On the 13th of February I returned to Haiti after a 2 months stay in Jamaica for medicals etc, and a little time with Jiréné our daughter. The airplanes made their last commercial flight on the 28th of February. The country has been on complete lockdown, internally as well as externally. No vehicles are able travel to or from PAP the capital, the centre of all national, civic and medical administration, of which approximately 86% is under gang related activities.

Prior to the present situation vehicles could only traverse by paying an extortion fee. On some occasions the vehicle and occupants were taken, some kidnapped and or abused, sometimes murdered and supplies looted. We had two family members who were kidnapped, one a 9 year old boy murdered after a part of the ransom was paid and another 62 years old who was released after 10 days of abuse.

In Cayes the capital of (Departement Sud) South department 154km/96miles from PAP is fairly quiet, though activities are sluggish as no vehicular activity with PAP. No supplies are brought in and none sent out. The farmers reaped only what can be sold in the market in and around Cayes but the bulk is left in the fields to spoil. The schools here are open after the threat of the children being caught and murdered was lifted. Some were said to have been stopped on the way to school, beaten and sent home.

Here we still meet in church for various meetings especially for fasting and prayer. Most of the missionaries are gone. The few that are left have been offered the option of evacuation by helicopter but decided to stay. We, the missionaries here, are planning our Easter sunrise service.

We love and appreciate you more than you know. You would not imagine what it feels like to get those messages and calls. To be able to tell my brothers and sisters here in my church MEBSH, that my brothers and sisters in my church, UCJCI, are praying for me, for us. This ignites a flame within giving the assurance that there will be a tomorrow regardless of how dark and dismal our night may seem or feel.




